President's Letter

We are entering Franklin High School's Centennial Celebration Year. One of the centennial themes is "We Are Seattle" honoring the important role that Franklin has played in educating a valuable workforce for the region's economy and for nurturing a strong group of civic leaders, political leaders, business leaders, artists and athletes.

The school will have numerous centennial activities during the year, and the Alumni Association is organizing a "Franklin 100" dinner at the beautiful and historic Arctic Club on April 28, 2012. We look forward to reconnecting with many of you that evening.

It has been a good year for Franklin High School and for the Franklin Alumni Association and Foundation. We continue to raise money from the alumni and community to provide support and encouragement to the student body and faculty. In an age of diminishing support for education, schools turn to parents for supplemental financial help.

Franklin has a century long tradition of diversity of race, ethnicity, culture, religion and economic means coming from the neighborhoods between Lake Washington and Beacon Hill and from Leschi to Seward Park. This richness of diversity has been an educational asset, but Franklin became less diverse starting in the 70's with the disconnecting of neighborhoods and schools and the acceleration of private education in Seattle.

The Franklin Alumni Association and Foundation has served as a bridge to the surrounding neighborhoods and to the historic diversity, and has reliably provided an additional source of funding and encouragement to the school.

In the past several years, diversity at Franklin is increasing again due in part to demographic shifts, economic downturns and a changing district policy that reconnects neighborhoods and schools. Standardized test scores at Franklin have dramatically improved which further encourages families of all backgrounds to educate their children at Franklin.

With these positive developments, the need for financial support continues, and the Franklin Alumni Association and Foundation is proud to play a role. We look forward to your continuing support and to seeing you on April 28.

Principal's Letter

Greetings Franklin!!

Happy 100th birthday Franklin! Below is a press release showcasing our recent performance on state exams. It was incredible way to start our centennial celebration!

At Franklin High School, which serves many students from the most diverse ZIP codes in the country, students are making steady progress through an emphasis on teacher leadership. Principal Jennifer Wiley credits the school's "incredible" staff for their hard work. "At Franklin," Wiley said, "we look inward and set about to build a school that can work for all kids. We believe all kids bring powerful intelligence to us and it is our job to unleash their genius."

The percent of Franklin students meeting proficiency on the HSPE increased in 2011 in all four tested subjects: reading, science, math, and writing. In reading, for example, the school went from just 64 percent of students meeting standard in 2010 to 80.9 percent in 2011, a number that exceeds the district-wide average. All student groups made gains in reading, and most made gains in writing and science as well, helping to reduce the school's achievement gap. Wiley noted that teacher leadership was the cornerstone of Franklin's success. "We share a common vision," she said, "and allow those who have content-specific expertise to chart the way. We diagnose, prescribe, monitor, and adjust all year long."

Wiley noted that Franklin staff focused on vocabulary development, reading comprehension and informational texts last year, and made sure students who were struggling in class received tutoring and one-on-one support. Wiley said that she and the team at Franklin are particularly proud of their literacy efforts and their work closing the achievement gap for nearly every student group in reading and writing. However, she and her staff are still not satisfied. "We will continue to push until all of our students perform at or above state standard," Wiley promised.

Of course, test scores are a smaller part of our success story. Our continued emphasis on service, our expanding arts program including a new choir, new steel drum band, new orchestra and recently ukulele class, our fantastic student clubs, nationally award-winning mock trial and xbot teams and all around great human beings make Franklin THE school in the state that helps all students from all walks of life build their dreams. Come check our newly renovated theater, gym, and wrestling room this season as we continue to get better and better.

Stay tuned... much more to celebrate in future months!

A core group of Franklin staff, students and alumni have been working for the last six months to plan a series of events to commemorate Franklin's centennial. Our theme? We are Seattle: Keys to the Past, Present and Future. We hope to involve as many alumni as possible in the celebration, to both honor the incredible accomplishments of Franklin graduates and the potential of our current students. Throughout the years, Franklin has developed several traditional events and this year we plan to infuse those activities with a focus on our proud history.

September: Our focus will be Homecoming, scheduled on the 30th (See article on page 3).

Albert (Al) Cohen, 1961: Yell Leader to School Superintendent

I grew up in a north side neighborhood of Mount Baker on 32nd Ave. South, between Massachusetts Street and Atlantic Street. This allowed me to go to John Muir Elementary School from kindergarten through sixth grade. Then I went to Washington Jr. High rather than the newer Sharples Jr. High, where all of my grade school friends attended. I was reunited with those friends at Franklin in 1957. At Franklin, I was an average student taking college prep courses. I did okay in the schoolwork, but really liked the social aspects of school. I joined the social club, The Cavaliers. Although most Franklin memories are positive, my one

big regret was that I did not play football, due in part to working after school at my dad's cleaning shop (next to McNamara's drug store on McClel-

lan St). I liked most of my teachers at Franklin, but three in particular made quite an impact on me; Frank Ahern (U.S. History), Tom Rekenthaler (Contemporary Problems – U.S.) and Laurel Pickett (Foods). I was forced to take Foods because I was removed from study hall too often. It worked out well for me as I ate well and the class was mainly girls.

As my junior year was coming to a close, Bob (Moe) Tacher convinced me to try out for the yell squad. Bob, Ron Alia, Don Grahn, Ron Malstrom and Mark Rubin made up the squad. A memory that really stands out for me had to do with Garfield. The Garfield basketball team that was headed to the state tournament. Most of the Garfield players I knew well from my junior high days. On the last basketball game of the regular season against Garfield, Franklin had a two-point lead over Garfield with almost no time left on the clock. Garfield's roughest player went to the foul line to shoot two free throws. He missed both of them and Franklin went on to beat the eventual state champions, 47 to 45. I would be remiss if I did not point out that working with Song Leaders Colleen Day, Karen Smith, Jill Gyselman, Diane Cooper, Linda Moore, Carole Good, Margaret Allyn and Patsy Allen, made being a yell leader worthwhile.

After high school, I attended the University of Washington where I majored in Elementary Education and Anthropology and joined Zeta Beta Tau Fraternity. Once my college classes were completed in 1965, I did my September experience at John Muir followed by my student teaching at Van Asselt Elementary. After student teaching, I got my first job teaching fifth grade at Whitworth Elementary. Three and half years later, I did an administrative internship at Sacajawea Elementary. From Sacajawea, I became the vice principal of T.T. Minor. Following Minor, I became principal for my first time at Montlake Elementary. I returned to

Whitworth as principal in 1974 and five years later, I made the difficult decision to leave Seattle Schools and went to the Northshore School District. In Northshore, I was the principal of Woodin Elementary and later Bothell High School. In 1981, I became head of the Northshore elementary schools and later head of the secondary schools.

Deciding to pursue other jobs in education requiring graduate school, I received my Masters Degree from UW and my administrative credentials and Doctorate Degree from Seattle University. The graduate degrees helped facilitate my transition to a variety of administrative positions. In 1990, I decided that becoming a school superintendent was my ultimate career goal. That year, I applied and was appointed superintendent of the Olympia School District where I served for eleven years. In 2001, I retired from Olympia but four months into retirement, I was asked to serve in the Clover Park School District as Deputy Superintendent and later as Superintendent. I retired from Clover Park in 2007, and currently work as a consultant for McPherson and Jacobson, an executive recruitment and development firm, specializing in working with school boards seeking a superinten-

On a personal note, I married Tina Bornstein in 1967 who I met at the U of W. We live in Olympia. We had two outstanding children (Dr. Mitchell Cohen, deceased, and Alisa Cohen, program manager at Starbucks) and three terrific grandchildren. I frequently see many of our Class of 1961; Jerry Mezistrano, John Muscatel, Bob Tacher, Alan Cohen, Victor DeLeon, and many others but less frequently. I feel very fortunate to have attended Franklin. Everywhere I go, I seem to meet people that also attended Franklin. Our school has a rich history. Not everyone can say they love their job. However, Charley Nelson, FHS Class of 1999, speaks with sincerity when he shares his feelings about his work as the manager for the St. Vincent de Paul Society Food Bank, located in the Georgetown neighborhood of Seattle. Each week over 800 people come through the doors of the food bank and each week they are greeted with a big smile and a kind heart. Charley is responsible for all aspects of the food bank—from procuring food to coordinating volunteers and paid staff. The St. Vincent food bank is one of the larger ones in the city and plays a significant role in feeding the hungry in the South Seattle community.

"It's an honor to have a position where I can serve my community, my neighbors," says Nelson. "You have no idea how grateful I am to have found a place in life where I can do that kind of service."

While at Franklin, Charley experienced a microcosm of the world. The Rainier Valley neighborhood of Franklin was altogether different than his own on Queen Anne. There was vari-

ety, richness in language, race, and cultures. Experiencing the diverse student body had a profound impact on Charley and he states, "I wouldn't have had the perspective I have today, if it wasn't for Franklin." This perspective gives Nelson insight in his daily work with many, many people from all walks of life.

While reminiscing about his time at Franklin, Charley shared fond memories of teachers. There was Ms. Martenson who was his ceramics teacher during his senior year.

Ms. Faye, inspired him because of her enthusiasm for U.S. History. "Ms. Faye was in her early 20's and related to us really well."

In particular were Charley Nelson's memories of Mike Lawson, the woodshop teacher. "He was a mentor for a number of young men; a figure to look up to." As a teacher, Charley found Mike Lawson to be "honest and trustworthy—he was the kind of teacher you knew cared sincerely about his stu-

dents". He recalls especially the fishing trips Mr. Lawson sponsored and organized so kids could learn the basics of fishing and experience the outdoors.

One of Charley's only regrets about his time at Franklin was not joining more student run activities, in particular the drama club—F.A.M.E

After graduation, Charley continued his education at Shoreline Community College (A.A Degree) and Western Washington University (B.A.). He married Nancy Vu (FHS '2000), and they have two children.





Seattle Street named after Former Franklin Spanish Teacher

On August 28th, 2011 Mr. Robert Maestas, a beloved FHS teacher, the long time director of El Centro de la Raza and social activist was honored with a street named in his honor. The "Robert Maestas Festival Street" is located on Beacon Hill next to El Centro de la Raza and the Beacon Hill Light Rail Station. Mayor Mike McGinn and many city dignitaries were there to honor Mr. Maestas' life work and memory. Class of '68 alumni, Theresa Escobar, Donna Amira, Shirley Kieser and Ric Rivera, were there to represent all Franklin students who were fortunate to know and learn from Mr. Maestas.

Mr. Maestas, who died of lung cancer in 2010, taught Spanish at Franklin from 1966 to 1968. In March of 1968 a sit-in led by three young activists (Larry Gossett, Aaron Dixon, and Carl Miller) took place. Two female black students had been suspended for refusing to change their Afro hairstyles. The protesters occupied the principal's office and demanded reinstatement for the girls, recognition of a Black Student Union chapter, and other reforms. Mr. Maestas was the only teacher who stayed to hear their concerns.



"The righteousness of their cause had such an impact on him that the next morning he went into the teachers' lounge and said, 'My name is no longer Robert or Bob,' recalled Larry Gossett, he said, 'I



am Roberto,' rolling those Rs as only he could do. That's when he became an activist."

Maestas commented that given... "the contradictions, the absence of minority history, the growing sentiment in the black civil rights movement, I became a pretty active teacher." He left Franklin and entered the University of Washington the following year, receiving his master's degree in Latin American studies in 1971.

He continued to be an activist, helping to form a program at South Seattle Community for Adult Basic Education and English as a Second Language to serve the city's growing Latino community in the early 1970s. Funding for that program was cut in 1972 and he, fellow teachers, students and other community members peaceably occupied the abandoned Beacon Hill School and negotiated its conversion into a community center, El Centro de la Raza. He served as director of El Centro until 2009. He also co-founded the Minority Executive Director's Coalition in the 1980s with fellow colleagues, Bernie Whitebear, Larry Gossett, and Bob Santos.

Mr. Maestas embodied a love of teaching and devotion to equity and social justice that inspired all who knew him. We are proud to claim him as an important part of Franklin's history.

Alexander Grant Gives Rise to Peer Health Education Program at Franklin

In the fall of 2010, the Franklin Alumni Association awarded \$3,000 to Franklin School Nurse Robin Fleming to initiate a peer health education program. The program links the Alexander Endowment's aim to promote improved reproductive health education and outcomes with Fleming's experience in establishing evidence-based programs that foster student leadership and learning.

The Q-TIHP (Quaker Teens Improving Health Problems) program has a core of dedicated students who meet weekly during lunch to receive instruction from community experts on a variety of topics. Last year they identified mental health and reproductive health as critical issues for Franklin students. Q-TIHP developed a multi-pronged strategy that included learning, teaching, and sponsoring school-wide community health events.

First, an expert from Youth Suicide and Prevention Program (YSPP) attended several Q-TIHP meetings, teaching students about mental issues and signs of suicide, and guiding them on delivering it. After learning the curriculum, the students spent several weeks practicing teaching it, then culminated this learning by presenting the curriculum to their peers in multiple classrooms. After program delivery, there was a spike in student visits to both the school nurse and the Franklin Teen Health Center seeking assistance for themselves, or expressing concerns about friends for mental health issues. One of the presentations was featured on KING-5 television's children's health newslink.

The second curriculum students learned was on the realities of teen pregnancy and parenting. Their program focused on the long-lasting impacts of teen childbearing and parenting on the lives of teens, parents, and the greater community. Co-taught by Lisa Love, lead health educator for Seattle Public Schools, and Marci Reichert of Planned Parenthood, the students eagerly absorbed the curriculum over the course of several weeks. Then they practiced giving the presentation, followed by conducting actual classroom

presentations. Planned Parenthood has been impressed with this program and one of their experts in developing peer health education programs will work directly with Q-THIP this coming year (including an all-day retreat in October).

As this fledgling group grows deeper roots, its members also are considering larger issues, such as managing membership, managing a health blog for Franklin students, designing programs, initiating partnerships, and sharing its story to those in the public health community. An abstract outlining Q-THIP and the economic, educational, social, and public health benefits conferred by peer health education programs success was accepted by the Washington State Public Health Association. A team will go to Vancouver, Washington October 18 to present their findings.

This terrific program would not have been possible without the incredible generosity of the Alexander Fund Grant. We are looking forward to another fruitful year of health education with the Fund's continued support!


Wintana Solomon Haile
