"I've been to reunions, but this is really incredible," commented one attendee. "It's amazing to see this many people reflecting so much Franklin history." Students welcomed alumni and helped to serve. Deems Tsutakawa'72, entertained with his original sound, and student Jillian Vu sang.

Caprice Hollins'83, served as emcee and kept the evening moving, deftly managing the audience with humor and grace. The program included a report of the year's accomplishments by FAA&F President Sara Thompson'68. Board member Tai Mattox Velasquez'92, made an appeal for financial support.

It was the induction of five Franklin graduates into the Hall of Fame that made the evening a real night to remember.

Bob Nathane'66, presented Keye Luke'22. Keye's family came from as far away as Los Angeles to accept the award. Bob outlined Keye's remarkable career which encompassed visual art as well as a storied acting career. Keye's family gave thanks and the next day presented one of his paintings to the Wing Luke Museum.

Ralph Vacca'53, spoke of Pete Pedersen'38. With fond memories of days when his parents grew and sold vegetables in a field next to the old baseball park – Sick's Seattle Stadium – (where he collected balls from home runs) and sneaking to the horse races, Ralph's reminiscences lit up the room with many smiles. John Chatalas accepted the recognition with promises to share it with Pete's wife in California. She was unable to attend.

Terry Caditz introduced her father, Barry Savage'54. She spoke of his career as a track coach, inspiring students and winning awards. Barry then accepted, and in his comments he remembered how formative his years were at Franklin, with particular recognition of his biology teacher Victor McClelland and track coach, LT Saalwaechter.

Gregory Dean'68, was not able to attend, but gave his thanks via a short video filmed at the neighborhood fire station with Franklin in the distance. His long career within the Seattle Fire Department culminated in his role as Chief, and just six months after his retirement he accepted the position as Chief in the Washington, DC, department.

Charlie Williams'70, introduced Cappy Thompson'70. He recollected the creativity she showed as a student and then reminded the crowd of her accomplishments and awards over the course of her career as a glass artist. Cappy's words of acceptance were short and sweet.

The evening could not have happened without the help of many. But particular thanks to Deb Burton'67, who catered the evening, and Molly Thompson'72, who worked with the student volunteers and performers, created the table centerpieces and stage managed the evening. Duma Maraire, '95: Making an Impact

Dumi Maraire, '95, has a wonderful story to tell. He raps under the handle Draze, has a song (*It Ain't the Same*) that has received major notice, and was a featured performer at this year's Northwest Folklife Festival. But those details don't begin to tell the whole tale.

Dumi's father and mother established the Zimbabwean marimba tradition in the Northwest more than forty years ago. From the age of five Dumi was on stage with the Sukutai Marimba Ensemble. He mastered the marimba, mbira and drums as they toured national and international venues.

As a teenager, Dumi connected to the urban music of the time — hip hop — and he began rapping in middle school. "But I was really bad," he recalled. During his freshman year at Franklin he wrote a song that was played on KUBE93, and he kept working hard. "I listened, I studied melody and rhyme, and I wrote. And most importantly I learned to trust myself. By my sophomore year I was good."

He continued to tour with his family, and after high school he got his AA from Seattle Central. But his own music was his primary focus. He and his brothers formed C.A.V.E. and released an album, and toured extensively for four years. When his good friend and fellow rapper Jay Willis, who suggested Draze as a professional name, was killed in 1998, Dumi decided to make a go of it as a solo performer. He briefly moved to New York, but "just couldn't be away from my daughter" and returned to Seattle.

In 2014 Dumi wrote The



Hood Ain't the Same, a song about gentrification. It became part of a compilation celebrating the fiftieth anniversary of the Seattle World's Fair. "It highlights all the areas in the Central District and the South End. And Franklin was in the middle of it all," he remarked. The song led to many new connections. Macklemore retweeted the song, it was placed in a time capsule at the Museum of History and Industry, and his music since then has been featured on such shows as Fox's Empire. Royalty checks remind him that his music is now played around the world.

Dumi's interests expand beyond music. His entrepreneurial spirit revealed itself in high school when he arranged his first big party, handing out fliers at a basketball game and netting several thousand dollars. Years later, when he and a friend (a Garfield graduate) were arguing about which school basketball team would be the best if teams were created of top players from the previous 10-15 years. Why not actually try it out, they thought. And from that came the "Hood

Classic," a game pitting Franklin and Garfield alumni. They filled the Franklin Gym that summer and continued the tradition for the next seven years.

From the Hood Classic was born BrandKings, a company that offers branding, consulting and event planning. That expertise has allowed Dumi to produce "Through the Eyes of Art" for the past two years, the kick-off event at the EMP for Black History Month. This event, held on the first Saturday in February, is the best-attended Black History event in the state and showcases local artists and performers. Gentrification was the theme in 2014; the Value of Black Life in 2015. He is considering the theme for 2016.

Franklin continues to have an important place in Dumi's heart. He remembers some favorite teachers, Len Kashner for biology, Ron Hailey for history and Rick Nagel for law and society. "We had huge pride – there was something special about our class. Black and Green is who we are," he said. "My best friends are friends from that time. We broke the basketball 'curse' and beat Garfield, and we won back-to-back state championships."

Never content to rest on his laurels, Dumi has new projects and plans. This fall he will release *Seattle's Own*, a new CD with *The Hood Ain't the Same* and ten new songs. And this fall he heads back to school. He will attend the Seattle School of Theology and Psychology to seek a Master of Arts in Theology and Culture.

No doubt we will be hearing more from this remarkable Franklin graduate.

Before classes begin each fall, we kick off our year through athletics. We are gearing up for our fall blood drive where we will set new records on numbers of donors as we do every year. Last year alone, FHS blood donors were able to save as many 806 lives through our contributions.

Donnie Chin 1955-2015

Donnie Chin had a lifelong commitment to the International District and was a beloved member of that community. His family founded Sun May, a hand-laundry company that evolved into a jewelry store and then a gift shop. Young Donnie worked at the family

store, and grew up surrounded by the stories, struggles, and triumphs of his neighbors. He left Franklin before his scheduled graduation in the early 1970s.

Donnie founded the International District Emergency Center (IDEC), because he felt the police and fire departments were slow to respond. Donnie

learned first aid and trained others; he listened to the police radios to be first on the scene. The IDEC became a hang-out, drop-in spot for many young people, and people just trying to learn about the Chinatown/

International District. Over the years, he mentored hundreds of young people about Asian American history, the history of the area, and the importance of community service.

He responded to thousands of emergencies -

medical and emotional traumas, fires, shootings, assaults, car accidents, break-ins, water leaks and power outages. The IDEC staffed first aid booths at community events.

On July 23, 2015, Donnie was found with life threatening gunshot wounds at 3am on Eighth Avenue and South Lane. He later died at the hospital. The investigation by the

Seattle Police is ongoing, though it is believed he was caught in crossfire when he rushed to help someone in need. Donnie was 59 years old at the time of his death.



Donnie's close friend Dean Wong, a Cleveland graduate, wrote of Donnie at our request.

In the long history of Franklin High school, no Quaker has touched more lives than Donnie G. Chin. Donnie served the community 24/7. He devoted his life to protecting the community as director of the International District Emergency Center (IDEC) for decades. In this time, Donnie and his IDEC volunteers touched the lives of thousands of people.

Donnie built first aid kits using square suitcases that weighed at least 40 pounds. We monitored 911 calls and rushed to the scene of emergencies, carrying these cases. I always lagged behind my stronger Asian brother. For uniforms he chose bright red and yellow jumpsuits. I hated them. We looked like Asian popsicles who needed haircuts.

Donnie knew the elders, many with no families to speak of. He looked out for them while they were alive and when they died alone he was often there for them. Donnie treated the Asian elderly with the utmost respect. I think he regretted never learning Chinese, but he developed a sense for what was being said to him. During these "runs," the seniors looked to him for help in communicating to paramedics. Donnie's sixth sense enabled him to understand.

IDEC volunteers like myself helped operate aid stations at the Chinatown-International District Dragon Festival, Bon Odori, White River Buddhist Church, JamFest and other events. The current youngest member was 15 a few years ago when she stood by Donnie to help a woman who had stepped off a sidewalk and injured herself. The oldest is 70 or so. One is a retired King County Police Officer.

The Seattle Fire Department respected him as did the Seattle Police. Each time a new rookie police officer was assigned to Chinatown, they took time to adjust to his presence. They eventually did. In death, Donnie was honored by the Seattle Police and Seattle Fire Department who finally considered him their equal.

Donnie earned countless awards he was always reluctant to accept. He shied away from the limelight. He was humble and wanted no part of the accolades. A true unsung hero.

Nearly 500 people attended three separate events to honor Donnie's life. People still leave flowers in front of his family store, the Sun May Company, in Canton Alley. The Wing Luke Museum has created a Donnie Chin exhibit in the alley's storefront windows. Visit Donnie's memorial at 5½ Canton Alley.

Rainier, went on to lead a series of commands in the Marine Corps all over the world, then retired to start a career as a trial attorney, later writing four books along the way and finally retiring again as an Associate Dean at a northwest law school.

Our numbers are declining as we age. Our reunions 20 years ago would number 70 to 80 persons. Although much smaller in number now, we are still strong Franklin Alums.



























CLASS OF 1955's 60th REUNION

16th Annual Franklin High School Picnic – Coulon Park



Harry was active at Franklin. In addition to playing tenor saxophone in the Franklin band he served as captain of the track team and president of Boys' Club. She is a musician herself and commented, "My instruments in high school band were flute and piccolo, and I went on to play piccolo for the Husky Marching Band my first year at UW."

strange but important coincidence has occurred with five FHS graduates surrounding the fish and wildlife resources of our great State of Washington.

Here is the story: **Frank Haw** 50, went on to the U of W and started his career working in water resource planning for the Corp of Engineers. Later he went to work for the Washington Department of Fisheries, eventually elevating to Deputy Director and Interim Director of the Agency. Since his retirement he has worked at Northwest Marine Technologies and is presently writing a book on salmon in Puget Sound. Frank helped pass key legislation that resulted in restoration of wild coho and chinook in Puget Sound. His entire career has been involved with the fish resources of our state.

Connie Mahnken'56, went to the U of W and graduated in Oceanography with a PHD in Fisheries. After working within several Federal agencies he spent a career at the NOAA Laboratory on Hood Canal specializing in restoring endangered species of salmon and steelhead throughout our state. After retirement he accepted a position as a member of the Washington Fish and Wildlife Commission where he presently serves. Another FHS grad doing a great job for the fish and wildlife of our state.

Frank Urabeck'56, went on to U of W eventually getting his Masters at the University of Maryland in Civil Engineering. After spending a career with Corp of Engineers working on Salmon and Steelhead conservation in our state he retired and has been a driving force on many fish issues in the Puget Sound area. He has served on several advisory committees for several governors on salmon and steelhead issues. Lately, he has been one of the leaders in preserving the Sockeye run on Lake Washington and its tributaries. Another remarkable career for the fish resources of our state.

Phil Anderson'68, had a twenty-five year career in the charter boat business and at the same time was appointed to the Pacific Fisheries Management Council. In 1994 he went to work for the now merged Fish and Wildlife Agency starting out as special assistant to the director. He was elevated to Deputy Director and has served the last six years as Agency Director. He is currently in the process of retiring. Wow!! Here is another FHS grad that has spent his career working with and for the fish and wildlife of our state.

I, Larry Cassidy'57, have had at the pleasure of working with all of these men over their careers, and except for Connie Mahnken, never met them until I got involved in the fish and wildlife resources of our state. Living in Vancouver I have worked for every governor from Dan Evans to Christine Gregoire on fish and wildlife issues. My involvement included positions on: Fish and Wildlife Commission 1973-1985; Northwest Power and Conservation Council 1998-2008; U.S. Commissioner to the Pacific Salmon Treaty 2000-2004; U.S Commissioner to the North Pacific Anadromous Fish Commission 2000-2004. The last two were presidential appointments. Currently, I am working on conservation issues on the Columbia Basin Fish resources.

Kimberly Nichole, '00, Strikes a Note

Timberly Nichole (Kimberly Johnson) '00 is making a splash. Google her and you get 703,000 hits. With a voice described as "very edgy, blues, rock and roll" she got a wider audience last spring as a contestant on The Voice.

Kimberly grew up in Seattle in the Rainier Valley. She and her sister, who is a year older, both graduated from Franklin. When asked about her music background, Kimberly said, "I grew up singing in church as a little girl and also sang in a Seattle

community choir when I was in middle school. There was no choir when I was at Franklin, but I was in FAME (Franklin's drama program) and performed in many musicals directed by Mary Smith. It was an awesome experience – I learned so much from her!"

In remembering Franklin and its impact on her life, Kimberly commented, "I loved my high

school journey at Franklin. Some of my best friends I met there and I learned so much being a part of musical theater (FAME) and a part of Dance Posse. I also was in advanced math and language arts. It really assisted me in my college journey and the early stages of my development as a musician/artist."

After graduating from Franklin, Kimberly went to Atlanta to study at Spelman College, a historically black liberal arts school for women. She became the first college-educated person in her family, earning a degree in economics.

She continued to live in Atlanta, working in human resources in the fashion industry. And she sang on the side. Eventually she moved to New York City to work and to pursue a career in music. She performed at open mic nights and ultimately had a regular spot at "The Box," an exclusive club.

Then came The Voice. "One of my best friends was on the show and they were looking for additional singers to add to the casting. She submitted a few videos of me and they flew me to the blind auditions," Kimberly explained.

The Voice is an NBC singing competition that has aired since 2011. Starting with blind auditions, the top twenty performers are chosen. Each singer chooses

from one of four coaches. From that point each singer is judged by the coaches and the audience until the final winner is announced. Fans of Kimberly Nichole were on their seats known as "The Rock Ballerina" for the custom-made tutus she wore on stage, she wowed the critics and the audiences. The competition took her to the top six.

About her time

on the show, she said, "It was a great experience. I learned a lot. It was like boot camp for the mainstream music industry. I met some great people while on the show."

And now? "I'm still writing new music and performing and planning what's next for my career." She has had multiple appearances including in Seattle at the Hard Rock Café, Oct. 24. She will be in Seattle in November for the Runway to Freedom Benefit on Nov. 19 and to sing the national anthem at the Seahawks vs Steelers game Nov. 29.



Franklin Graduates Receive Scholarships from Alumni

Last spring we were thrilled to award scholarships to nine Franklin seniors. We have three scholarship programs and we welcome donations to all of them. Over the past nine years we have helped 53 Franklin students attend college. Franklin's counseling office coordinates communication with students and collects applications to be reviewed by our scholarship committee. Twenty-three outstanding students applied in 2015.

The *Franklin Scholarship Fund* was established by graduates from the class of 1935. FAA&F assumed responsibility when members of that class asked for assistance. Awards are based on need, academic achievement and community service.

The *Roy Nakagawa Achieve to Succeed Scholarship* was established by the Nakagawa family in honor of their father who graduated from Franklin in 1935. Roy was captain of the football team. Though he experienced many hardships in his life, Roy fondly recalled his Franklin experiences up to the time of his death at age 97. One scholarship a year is dedicated to a member of the Franklin football team. An additional scholarship was awarded this first year to another senior athlete with financial need.

The *Gilman Scholarship Fund*, established in 2008 by Bonnie Rattner'55, in honor of her brother Robert "Bud" Gilman'52, who was a middle school counselor and a jazz pianist. Bonnie noted that they both loved music, and we knew that it can be very difficult to make money as a musician and to get assistance to study. She established this scholarship to recognize students choosing a field that gives so much joy to people.

Jim and Midge Patten: Golf and Life

Midge, '60, and Jim Patten, '58, love all things golf. And not just playing; they actually love the rules! With the golf mania that hit this region when the US Open Golf Championship came to Chambers Bay in June, this is a good time to tell their story.

Jim started playing golf at age eleven when he learned to play at the Jefferson Park Course, where current Franklin students learn to this day. Midge didn't start playing until years later, when Jim suggested she learn to play – with vacations and ultimately retirement in mind.

As she played tournaments she discovered that many people didn't know the rules – and she began to study them in order to protect herself from bad calls when playing with other women in her local golfing club. She said she studied the rules book as though it were an SAT test, and soon was asked to be the club's representative to the Pacific Northwest Golf Association (PNGA).

"That turned out to be a thirty-some year commitment that soon included Jimmie," she said.

It began with volunteering to serve as a rules official for amateur championships, and then to serve as Rules of Golf Chairman for the PNGA. She held that position for twenty-five years.

Golf does have its rules. There are the Rules of Golf and then there are Decisions on the Rules, with many hundreds of pages to understand and remember. Midge attended several workshops, and Jim joined her on the third year. They were tested on their knowledge and ultimately also took an advanced workshop that taught them about tournament work including how to mark and define a course for a championship.

The USGA became aware of their proficiency and for the next twenty years they served. Jim was a member of the USGA Amateur Public Links Championship Committee. Midge joined the USGA Senior Women's Amateur Championship Committee.

"During our time with the USGA, we were asked to work well over 50 National Championships. Most were United States Amateurs Championships, but we worked many US Women's Open Championships."

Midge described what a rules official does: "When we get to a venue we walk the course, taking notes on how it should possibly be marked for out of bounds,



water hazards, and ground under repair. We look for anything we can find that may cause uncertainty in the mind of the player in how to play the course. Then all of the rules officials meet together with the USGA staff and discuss what local rules can be written to allow the championship to proceed with situations that might arise covered by the local rules. Then every rules official is assigned to a group of players in stroke play, and we walk along with them to answer any questions that might come up."

She described her most unusual experience, when working a championship in North Carolina. "Every day I would hear on the radio about needing a bunker rake out on hole number six. All of us officials figured it must be kids stealing them. One day I remembered to look around while my match was on the sixth hole. High up in a tall pine, was a huge eagle's nest, and sticking out of this nest in every possible direction, were bunker rakes! A photographer came out to take pictures of it after I reported it, and later he interviewed me for a magazine. My name and a picture of an eagle's nest made it into a national magazine!"

Both Jim and Midge have received honors for their years of volunteer commitment to golf. In 2000 Midge was recognized with the PNGA Distinguished Service Award. Jim received the WSGA George Holland Volunteer of the Year Award for 2011.

They attended the Chambers Bay tournament and enjoyed every moment without any responsibilities.

Now retired, the Pattens can return to playing golf regularly. When they were working as officials they hardly had time to play during the golf season. And while Midge says her game has declined as she becomes "orthopedically challenged," she still has fun.

Consider a Hall of Fame Nomination

FAA&F welcomes nominations to the Franklin Hall of Fame. The Hall of Fame Committee will review nominations, present recommendations to the Board of Directors, and announce inductees in February. Inductees will be honored at the Annual Meeting and Hall of Fame Celebration May 19, 2016.

Just over fifty alumni have been elected to the Hall of Fame since 1992 when it was established by a group of students and Franklin staff to celebrate Franklin's 75th anniversary. Starting in 2013 FAA&F has hosted a Hall of Fame Celebration each spring inducting new members. Everyone in the Hall of Fame is posted on our website and their pictures are in the main hall at Franklin.

Criteria for induction are as follows

- Must have graduated from Franklin
- Must have graduated at least 15 years prior to nomination
- May be living or deceased
- Shall have gained prominence and recognition on a national, state, regional, or local level in his or her chosen field or endeavor. Those fields of endeavor shall include, but not be limited to, business and industry, education, medicine, law, science and research, religion, sports, politics and government, entertainment, volunteerism and international relations
- Shall have conducted his or her life in an honorable manner
