More than 200 people were in attendance at the Mount Baker Community Club on October 20, 2005 to honor Faye Mondschein Sarkowsky '51, Gerard Tsutakawa '65 and A.D. Vickery '63 as they were inducted into the Franklin Hall of Fame.

Each of the honorees talked about how their experiences at Franklin High School helped shape their lives. Faye went on to become a well-recognized philanthropist who has served as an active board member and leader of many major arts and non-profit organizations such as the Seattle Art Museum, Children's Hospital and the Washington Women's Foundation. She was the first female president of PONCHO and the Fifth Avenue Theatre Association. *(continued on page 5)*

Notes from the President

Spring is upon us. Students are making plans for the summer and for life beyond high school. Alumni are planning their reunions – from the class of 1996 to every decade back for at least 70 years. And as a member of the Franklin Alumni Association and Foundation Board I have been fortunate to be at least a small part in the lives of both students and alumni. It has been a busy year for us as we remain dedicated both to the goals of keeping alumni connected to each other and to Franklin, and to providing support for current students.

Staying Connected

In October we hosted the Hall of Fame at the Mount Baker Community Center. Thanks to a superb planning committee and a joyful group in attendance, everyone had a wonderful time with great food, good company and a chance to celebrate the accomplishments of three Franklin graduates – Fay Sarkowsky, A.D.Vickery and Gerard Tsutakawa. We plan to make this a regular event, with the next one in the fall of 2007. If you are interested in helping, in attending or have nominations you would like to make, please let us know.

Several classes have made use of our database as they make reunion plans. And for the first 10-year reunion we have a grant of \$250 available to help get things started. The classes of 1995 and 1996 have both taken advantage of the offer.

Supporting the Franklin community

This has been a very successful year for Franklin. Probably the most visible success was the basketball team – winning the state championship. Other teams had impressive performances: Mock Trial won the regional competition and took second place in a closely fought state competition, The Dance Posse and the XBOT teams also won regional meets.

FAA&F support for Franklin is largely through our grants program. This year we made another \$20,000 in grants with two grant cycles – one in the fall and the other this spring. Examples of grants given are: Writers in Schools, Grad Night, the bilingual program, Fun and Sober Teens, Mock Trial, the drama program, the language arts and social studies program and the math department.

This June we will give two scholarships to deserving seniors thanks to the Class of 1935 Scholarship Fund.

A Major New Undertaking

This fall Franklin's new athletic field will be completed. That will be a wonderful enhancement for our students. The gym, however, is not a part of the renovation and is in need of a facelift. We want our students to be proud of the facility when they host events at Franklin. This is a great opportunity – we propose a major campaign to raise money to provide that facelift. In addition we plan to include display cases to house trophies and awards. Keep your eyes and ears open as we make plans. There are many opportunities: we will be investigating our history and looking for trophies that may have been misplaced; we will be raising money and we will be hoping for in-kind donations as well. 

50th REUNION FHS Class of 1955

At 2:45 pm on Friday, September 9, 2005, 182 senior citizens (111 classmates, 5 former teachers, guests and spouses) met at the high school to register for the day's event. Each classmate picked up their ID card (the 1955 Tolo photo with the name inscribed on it.) There was time to mix, socialize, and admire the familiar Franklin hallways. Many took advantage of this respite to look for commemorative tiles purchased by classmates, which are mounted on the walls and floors. The school looked very fresh, clean and well maintained.

We then assembled in the theater for a briefing of the afternoon activities that would follow. Bruce Cohoe, in Carl Nickerson's (our senior class president) absence, stepped to center stage and made us feel very welcome within the hallowed building that remains an architectural jewel in Rainier Valley. Bruce's remarks were followed by a welcome and a salute offered by Jennifer Wiley, Principal of Franklin High School to all in attendance, who returned to admire their alma-mater.

Ms. Wiley explained that the demographics of Franklin High School's student body have changed over the 50 years since our graduation. She directed our attention to the complexions of the current song leaders who had

joined our assembly and who would soon escort us on a tour of the building. The song leaders came to the stage when called by Ms. Wiley and performed three high school favorites. Ms. Wiley applauded the generation represented by the Class of 1955 for laying the cornerstones of social change that launched an agenda of diversity within our national conscience. She assured us that Franklin High School still holds the same values that we were taught by Walter Reseburg and that graduates continue to make a difference in our society. We were dismissed from the theater to the hallways where we assembled into small groups with our guides.

Our group of ten was led through the once familiar hallways by two young lady song leaders. They were already dressed for the football game with Bothell High School that would be played that evening. We passed every classroom on the first, second and third floors. The girls explained how the classrooms were organized in a manner that, as much as possible, kept students of the same grade level in the same areas, or floors. As we passed by the classrooms we were told to which teacher it was assigned and what subjects were taught. We were assured that the swimming pool on the 4th floor remains as we left it,

and how upper classmates sell tickets to incoming lower class members for them to take the elevator to the 4th floor for a swim in the pool.

After the tour, we were escorted to the cafeteria, the very large room we used to call "Study Hall". We were assembled to enjoy an Italian buffet catered by That's Amore. The room was attractively arranged with many tables, each with place settings and a centerpiece. Around the room were tables and display boards holding memorabilia from our Franklin experience. There was plenty of time to move around the room and reintroduce ourselves to the older and wiser people that we have become. Fortunately, our picture IDs led to easy introductions and resultant joy and laughter.

All at once we noticed a familiar personality who had joined our assembly; surprisingly, it was Marilyn Monroe. She moved about the room making small talk and having photos taken with various classmates. At one point, she was handed a microphone and addressed the group. She said she and two other celebrities would be performing at the formal dinner the next night and hoped all of us would be there. After the announcement, she continued to mix around the room so that others







The XBOT is student designed, built and assembled – much of this was accomplished using the Microsoft Hardware Lab. Here some of the FHS team experienced the manufacturing process using an NC machine, lathe, drill, press and laser cutter, while others assembled the XBOT hardware.

These students are being assisted and mentored by professionals who volunteered over 150 hours each. The XBOT sponsors are: Microsoft and Boeing Robot Fanatic employees, Pacific Iron Building Materials, Pearl



Babes, Straightline, and Skeeter's Auto Rebuild, who provided donations and in kind services.

The XBOT design criteria for 2006 was, "Aiming High". The robot must either shoot a ball into a goal eight feet off the ground or deliver balls to a lower goal. XBOT's design took advantage of the large hopper which could hold 60 balls and had the ability to dump balls into the lower goal. You would continually hear the announcer yell, "XBOT dumps another load for their Alliance!"

Mock Trial Triumphs

The 2005-2006 year continues to be remarkable for the Franklin High School Mock Trial Team. They started out last fall with only three returning varsity members and a room full of rookies, including their new coach, Don Eaton. But what the team lacked in experience, they more than made up for in tenacity and talent.

They took first place in the King County Regional, Washington's toughest, by an unheard of margin and were undefeated at State until the final round.

Franklin doesn't look or perform like any other team. Our ethnic diversity is unique to the competition, but it is our sense of flair and style that really puts Franklin over the top. The witnesses entertain, convince, cajole, and compel the courtroom. Our attorneys are deft, poised, articulate and masterful.

The momentum continues as the team prepares a new case for the American Mock Trial Invitational competition in Chapel Hill, North Carolina next month. Our team of rookies has become one of seasoned professionals in six short months, thanks in part to Eaton and his supporting coaching staff of Franklin Alums. Recent grads and former team members Jesse Parker, Katrina Miller and Ari Hargrave have been invaluable. Alums Charlie Williams, principal lawyer coach '70, and Molly Thompson, drama '72, continue coaching the team.

"In the last ten years Franklin's Mock Trial Team has won first place seven times in the King County regional competition, garnered six firsts in the State competition and relished winning first place nationally in 2000,"

Williams stated. "Franklin has had a dominant role over the years and this year's team has been exceptional. If there are any alumni interested in the program in any way, we'd love to hear from you."

For the past 17 years, the mock trial competition has pulled King County youngsters into the kind of civics lesson they could not get in the classroom. They learn a range of skills, from articulating an argument to speaking publicly with confidence. Then they test those skills in hours-long trials, where they watch the slow, deliberate process of the legal system in action.

Few of the mock trial participants plan to become lawyers, but it is felt that a hundred percent of them will go on to become better citizens.

The show ran for four evenings with opening night being completely sold out. Sharon Tomiko Santos

Grassroots involvement has always been important to Sharon Tomiko Santos. With an early start as an activitist, it would be interesting to note if close friends and teachers were able to predict that one day Santos would represent one of the most diversified districts in Washington State, the 37th District of Seattle.

Santos was a member of the graduating class of 1979, but she did spend a brief interval at Nathan Hale. "That was the period in the Seattle Schools where the district was faced with a Federal Court Challenge, so the district was encouraging voluntary desegregation. Ruth Ann Kurosi, a volunteer in the schools at the time, thought I would be a good candidate. As it turned out, Hale wasn't a good fit for me, so I happily returned to Franklin. You might say though that my activism started in high school."

My public speaking skills were honed through my experiences in the drama program, which was headed by Tom Williams the drama coach at the time. There were probably several teachers at Franklin that had an impact on my future, but two that gave me inspiration were Rick Nagel and Sarah Kaplan. While at Franklin, I do remember lobbying and making a presentation in front of the Seattle Public School Board. The topic was school segregation.

After graduating from Franklin, Santos went on to Evergreen State College in Olympia where she majored in Liberal Arts. From there she continued to pursue a higher



degree, receiving a masters degree in History from Northeastern University in Boston, MA.

In 1998, Santos was elected as a state representative and became the first Japanese-American woman elected to the Washington State House of Representatives. She was reelected in 2000, again in 2002, and another repeat in 2004. This fall, 2006, she will once again be facing her constituents and asking for their votes of confidence in the job she is doing.

She currently sits on the House Education, Finance, Financial Institutions and Insurance and the Rules Committee. In addition she serves as the Majority "Whip" in the House. When asking what a Whip is, Sharon explained that it is a leadership position, elected to by her peers. "The term whip is an old fox hunting term and it meant keeping the dogs focused. In 1913 the post of whip was first established in the US Senate. In the House you have a party leader, a caucus chair, a floor leader and a caucus whip. As a whip, I count votes and maintain discipline within the caucus."

She is also a member of the National Conference of State Legislators' Executive Committee and a **Democratic National Committee** Rules Committee member. Because she works hard to stay connected to her constituents she has received a number of honors. In 1993, she received the Martin Luther King, Jr. "Keeping the Dream Alive", in 1996 the Northwest Asian Weekly named her as one of the Top 10 Contributors to the Asian American community, and in 2000, she received the inaugural Bernie Whitebear Award from United Indian of All Tribes Foundation. Her interest in issues affecting women worldwide led her to attend the Fourth World Conference on Women in Beijing, China.

Being a member of or on a board for various organizations may seem grueling, but it helps to keep her abreast of her district and state. "The YMCA Youth and Government is actually the organization that sponsors the Mock Trial competitions for which Franklin has become such an outstanding contender over the years. They also have a Youth Legisture Program where students learn the process of government, run for office and have elections. The Public Service Academy at Franklin is a program that teaches students how to be involved in and also how to work through the process of government.'

One wonders when Sharon sleeps when she begins to mention all the organizations in which she is involved. One thing is certain, when Santos runs for her fifth chance to be a 37th District House of Representative, people know she stays focused, stays connected and can not be termed a slacker in any shape or form. She's definitely a "Whip" in and out of the legislature.

An April Letter from Coach Kerr

Dear Alumni,

With the season only a few weeks in our rear view mirrors, I wanted to take the chance to write to you to recap some spectacular accomplishments as well as acknowledge the help and support that these young men have received along the way.

As many of you know, the Franklin High School Varsity Boy's Basketball Team was victorious in bringing home the 2006 AAAA State Championship for the second time in four years. This was a tremendous accomplishment for these young men and we, as a coaching staff, are very proud of the effort and hard work that they put into this season. I would be mistaken if I said that we knew they would accomplish this all along. The field of teams was extremely strong and it was anyone's trophy to take home.

Bruno Boin was Mr Basketball in the '50s at Franklin

With basketball in the news, on TV, and also on our minds this spring, what better time to interview a Franklin Alum from 1954, Bruno Boin

Franklin High Quakers' 2006 team brought home the 2006 State High School Basketball trophy for the fourth time in the school's history. The teams of 1994 and 1995 won remarkable "back-to-back" state tournaments. In addition, the first state championship for Franklin occurred in 1954, when Boin was a team member. That particular year the championship game pitted Franklin against Garfield in the final game.

As an alumnus stated, "Bruno was a first. He was a player with a height presence of 6-foot-8 inches. He was definitely the beginning of what was to become a new trend in basketball."

While playing for Coach Leonard Saalwaechter at Franklin, Bruno was named to the Seattle All City Team his sophomore, junior and senior years. Upon graduation, he went on to play for the University of Washington coach, Tippy Dye, and earned All-Pacific Coast Conference honors in 1956 and captained the Huskies team in 1957 and 1959. During the 1958 season the U of WA was on probation so all of the sports teams were penalized. Bruno was picked up by the Buchan Bakers to help augment their team. The Bakers had won the 1956 AAU National Championship and had a strong presence in the basketball arena at the time.


In 1958, he was drafted by the St Louis Hawks, and in 1959 he was drafted by the Detroit Pistons. But being plagued with a chronic bad back since high school, he never played a game in the NBA. He did point out that while playing for the University of Washington, he never missed a practice or a game.

"It took me five years at the U of WA. I started out working on a chemical engineering degree and then changed my major and went on to earn a bachelor of science in mathematics.

I continued on to obtain an advanced degree in mathematics in the graduate school at UCLA "

When asked what kind of job a degree in math leads to, he explained that he went to work for Milliman & Robertson, a local actuary firm specializing in pension and retirement programs. The firm now has 43 offices and has become an international powerhouse.

In June of this year, Bruno and his college sweetheart, Sheila, will be celebrating their 46th wedding anniversary. When probing for more details, Bruno did share a humorous story. Seems both he and Sheila garnered wins in 'U Dub' campus competitions. Sheila was honored with a "Queen of Queens" title, while Bruno won the not so distinguished title, "Ugliest Man on Campus". Guess we can surmise



that with that combination they were meant to enjoy a long and successful marriage.

Since retiring in 1998, Bruno and Sheila split their time between Palm Desert, Calif. and Whidbey Island. "I took up the game of golf later in life, but now I'm enjoying spending as much time as possible on golf courses in the southwest or the northwest.

"I've been golfing, maybe flailing would be a better word, in the Annual FHS Alumni Golf Tournament for six years now. My FHS golfing partner, Al Link, was also a member of the 1954 State Basketball Championship Team and we've remained friends all these years."

"That golf tournament held right after Labor Day each year, has presented an opportunity for several decades of Franklinites to reconnect. And, since it's followed with a dinner, wives and non golfers have been attending also. What better time to enjoy a round of golf and also catch up with other Franklin alums."

Katie Houlahan Dolan – Duane Dolan 60 Years and Counting


On Sunday, April 10, 2006 a World Premiere produced by The Visual Media Group was staged in the Franklin High Theater. "April 30th –Sixty Years of Wedded Bliss and Bluster (1946-2006)"

The show had a cast consisting of hundreds of friends and family and the theme was billed as a film of historical survival.

"What better place to hold a wedding anniversary party," Katie Houlahan Dolan said. "This is where Duane and I first met." Katie was a student scheduled to graduate from Franklin in 1943 and Duane just happened to be a 'visiting' Garfield student graduating in 1941. They both went on to attend the University of Washington, Duane went into the Navy and after his release in 1946, they were married in the Mt Baker Presbyterian Church.

"When we first met we never guessed the fun and excitement that lay ahead, the twists and turnabouts, nor the overwhelming challenges that lay ahead. Our son, Patrick Dolan, was diagnosed in 1953 with autism and that dramatically changed out lives."

They became a family of unexpected victories over adversity and they took their message of hope to everyone. "We took the fight for disability rights anywhere and



everywhere: to Olympia, to Washington, DC; to editorial boards, to anyone who would listen and lots who didn't want to."

A former model, actress and TV news personality, Dolan uses drama, humor or just sheer cussed persistence to dent indifference. When families found going to agency offices for help too daunting, she brought the bureaucracy to them. She organized disability parties all over the state. Families would gather to share cake and food at community centers with agency staff who signed people up by the dozen for help they were entitled to, but didn't know existed.

Dolan was also on the front lines of Education for All. She helped to push the Legislature in 1971 to enact House Bill 90, the landmark legislation guaranteeing a public education to children with disabilities. After which she helped found The Troubleshooters, a statewide protection and advocacy program for people with developmental disabilities and their families. And in 1975, she and Duane started the state chapter of the Autism Society of America

"The famous Patrick Dolan, who was 21 when the state mandatory education law passed, never had a semester of public education, but helped bring it about for others. Today, Pat lives in his own subsidized house in his own neighborhood with an attending family and is now planning to either own a business or have a new job in the community."

"My inspiration comes from our heroes, our sons and daughters, who taught us what it really means to be human and to care for each other."

Together Katie and Duane direct the Houlahan Foundation which promotes the understanding of the civil and human rights of people with developmental disabilities. Their newest project is promoting Medicard for All, a simple medical card with a computer chip that can hold 80 pages of medical history and eligibility information for people who have severe disabilities of communication and cannot represent themselves to get medical care or social services. www.medicardforall.com



The Dolans found that life isn't always easy, but by facing problems together with an open heart, but mainly with family and friends surrounding in circles of support, they have had 60 exciting years together. Hopefully, their film of historical survival ended with a standing ovation.
