Congratulations to FHS Grad Gary Locke on his Confirmation as U.S. Secretary of Commerce

In the fall of 1996, the Quaker Times ran an article congratulating Gary Locke, Class of 1968, on his election as Governor of Washington State. Since our newsletter was reaching just a few of our current readers, we decided to reissue the article about how this Quaker ultimately found his way to Washington, D.C. The article follows:

The American dream and Gary Locke are synonymous. Born to Chinese immigrants of modest means, Locke's first home was in the Yesler Terrace Housing Project in Seattle. His parents operated a restaurant in the Pike Place Market, so Locke spent many hours playing in that historical site.

Winning the Governor's race, November 5, 1996, Locke is the first Asian American elected governor within the Continental United States. He now finds himself to be a role model to other minorities. "It's hard to think of myself as a role model," he said. "I am just an ordinary, average guy, I think. But I really think to be a role model I can help other Asian Americans and people of ethnic origins and different cultures participate in government by simply being the (Continued on page 9)

Bel Canto Choir - World Emissaries of the '60's

The group was extraordinary in that

Forty-three years ago ninety-four Franklin High School students under the direction of Mr. Richard Koehler concentrated on doing their absolute best to achieve personal satisfaction and to form one of the most profound high school choirs in the State of Washington The choir became known as the Bel Canto Choir, which consisted of the Concert Choir, the Honors Choir and the Madrigal Singers. The choir students mastered and memorized seventy-three pieces of music. Along with the Franklin High School Stage Band, under the direction of Mr. Waldo King, they moved and delighted their audiences in over one hundred and thirty performances in the Seattle Metropolitan area and throughout Europe as well.

At the time the students were mastering their

music, they were setting an academic standard for all extra-curricular programs in the Seattle school system maintaining a combined grade point average of over 3.5. Each student agreed to provide 100 hours of work on fund-raising

activities in order to make it possible to have a European experience as a choir. All the while, the students' demeanor was exemplary whether they were rushing to class at Franklin, traveling to a program, packing or placing risers, preparing to perform or performing together.

Once the school administration approved the project of raising funds for a European performing tour coupled with education experiences, the parents met with Dr. Richard Koehler, the choral director. All agreed that it was an exceptional opportunity for the students. The adults agreed that they would do whatever was necessary to help raise well over \$100,000 to expedite the European trip. At the same time it was explicit that all members of the Bel Cantos would go on the trip or none would go. Upon the commitment of the students, parents, and school system, the entire community of Seattle, and especially the Franklin High School family, became a willing part of the enormous venture.

The students sang wherever and whenever they were requested—twelve programs at the Boeing Christmas Circus at the Seattle Center Arena. They sang for programs at the Seattle Opera House or at local clubs, organization and care-giving centers. In Europe, they were one of the first American school choirs visiting Nancy, France and the sameAmerican flag that had been raised when General Patton liberated Nancy was raised to welcome them. The program was held in the Town Square where the liberation ceremony had taken place. They sang for thousands in the military, their families, officers and

civilians at Templehoff Air Base in Berlin. They sang with the Hamilton Academy Choir in Glasgow, Scotland. They did antiphonal selections during an Evensong at Llandorf Cathedral in Wales and were honored by Lord Mayors throughout Scotland, England and Wales as well as France and Holland. Remarkable as it seems, this was just in a year's time.

The group was on the move daily and in one month of performing and travel the educational experiences included but were not limited to visits to Scottish castles, cathedrals throughout Europe, major monuments and historical buildings in Great Britian and the European continent. The beautiful natural wonders of Lochness in Scotland, travels on the Rhine River in Germany and the French countryside. The

sobbering visits to West and East Berlin, and the Berlin Wall, Paris, France and Amersterdam. They traveled by chartered planes and buses, and train. Their inaugural adventure was on a DC-6 prop airplane with

flights ranging from 19 hours from Vancouver B.C. over Greenland to Scotland and a return trip from Amsterdam to Vancouver, B.C. which took 21 hours. Warmly greeted at the airport by loving families, they re-entered the United States via the border crossing in Blaine, Washington where they exited their three charter buses and standing at the monument sang with great enthusiasm the "Star Spangled Banner". (There wasn't a dry eye in the group.)

Keep in mind that in 1966 we were not the global community that we are today. To travel cross state with a band, choir or any other school group was an adventure let alone travel to Europe. The group was extraordinary in that our diversity as a group and personal friendships were inclusive of all communities, ethnic backgrounds and religions. As students in the Bel Canto Choir it was clear these were the very first BEST MEMORIES and a measue for things to come.

Countless stories can be related about the students, the parents, Mr. Loren Ralph, the Principal of Franklin, Mr. Jerry Sanford, who organized and headed up the parents support group, Dr. Richard Koehler, the director of the choirs, Mr. Waldo King, the director of the stage band, and a host of others throughout the community whose support and involvement successfully concluded the raising of the necessary funds for the trip. Above all, they all believed as Artis Palmer wrote in the Seattle Times that "Franklin High's Bel Cantos: Seattle's Finest Export," and indeed they were.

We are in the midst of the BEST time of the school year with students actualizing their learning inside the classroom and producing in incredible ways outside of the classroom.

You all may well know by now that our girls' Basketball team participated in state competition for the first time since 1995 and placed fifth in state! Our boys' team dominated in state competition and brought the state trophy back home to Franklin with ease. To add to that excitement, Peyton Siva was named a McDonald's All-American, Mr. Basketball for the state of Washington and Gatorade Player of the Year for Washington State bringing Franklin, once again, on to the national stage.

However, our bragging rights don't stop there! Our beloved Mock Trial team placed third in state competition behind two well-resourced private schools and they are now currently preparing for national competition. And....drum roll please....our Xbot team won the state competition and they, too, are now on their way to nationals.

For those of you ex-band members, know that our band program is once again on the rise and the spirit and energy of our band received just about as much attention at the state basketball competition as the team did! Individual students continue to receive admission at prestigious colleges and universities and are receiving many scholarships.

Our literacy and math scores continue to climb! What makes all of this success even more impressive is that, although our student poverty rate is currently relatively high, our successes continue to mount! That means we are coming closer and closer to actualizing our vision of being that public school where all things are possible for all kids irrespective of background. Franklin has always engendered this spirit of democracy and diversity and we continue to build on those foundational values.

We have a special thank you in order to Zach Fleet and our alumni board for years of tenacious persistence around getting a new reader board for Franklin. In these last months Zach and crew have cut major red tape and with your support and their efforts, we are very close to having a new state-of-the-art reader board. Stay tuned!!!

I personally want to thank you all not only for your current contributions but for the solid stepping stones for justice through education that you all have put into place for us to build dreams on. We take the mission of public education and Franklin High School very seriously and are most grateful for all of the support you have given. We will not fail you! in the words of Benjamin Franklin,

"An investment in knowledge always pays the best interest."

best governor I can be for the state of Washington." Locke is a strong proponent for public education. He attended Beacon Hill Elementary and graduated from Franklin High School in 1968. "I believe public education is the great equalizer," Locke stated.

He has not forgotten his roots as he finds the time to visit his old elementary school and talk about the value of studying. He has also revisited Franklin and spoken before Rick Nagel's Law and Society classes. Locke values the education he received at Franklin. "The great diversity of the student body! It did not matter if you were Asian American, African American or whatever, we had our friendships and you were appreciated as a person. We had a

feeling we could succeed no matter who we were. Even so called average students were encouraged to go to college and have become very successful academically and in their fields of work," Locke said.

Locke received a scholarship to Yale University where he received his undergraduate degree and then went on to receive a law degree from Boston University.

Locke has been the King

County Executive since January 3, 1994. This is the 13th largest county in the nation. He has overseen 13 departments, 1200 employees and an approximately \$2-billion annual budget. He has been directing the transit, health and water-quality regional services for 1.6 million county residents, including the city of Seattle. He has been in charge of police protection and other local services for about 500,000 people living in unincorporated King County.

dent.

From January 1983 to December 1993, Locke was a member of the Washington State legislature. For five years, he headed the House Appropriations Committee. He also served on the House Judiciary Committee. He received an "outstanding" rating from the Municipal League. The Olympian rated him #3 in effectiveness among all the state legislators and in 1991 he was named legislator of the Year by the WA Federation of State Employees.

When it comes to fine details, Locke is especially efficient and talented. He raises orchids and gardenias as a hobby. His secretary mentioned that when he began his campaign for governor, he took his plants out of the office for fear that they would not receive proper attention. A close friend, Mary Charles, jokingly offered, "Gary gave me an orchid a year ago and when he comes to visit, he almost appears to check out the orchid's condition before saying hello."

Recently in 2009, President Obama announced Gary Locke as his choice to lead the Commerce Department. "Gary knows the American Dream. He's lived it. And that's why he shares my commitment to do whatever it takes to keep it alive in our time," said

the President.

"The Department of Commerce plays a critical role in nurturing innovation, expanding global markets, protecting and managing our ocean fisheries, and fostering economic growth," Locke said. "The Department of Commerce can and will help create the jobs and the economic vitality our nation needs."

Locke told the story of his family's journey to the United States and their struggle for success, and offered it as an example of American ingenuity and determination.

"My family's story is America's story," Locke said. "Our story is just one of hundreds of millions since the birth of our nation, of people coming from every part of the world in pursuit of the American Dream of freedom, hope and opportunity. In hard times, Americans have rallied together, sacrificed and even given their lives for our country, because they believe in the essential goodness and promise of America."

The Franklin community is proud of Gary Locke and will be eagerly watching his achievements as leader of the Commerce Department.

Mock Trial on the Winning Trail



The 20th YMCA High School Mock Trial Competition took place in a series of weekend and evening trials between February 21 and March 2, 2009. The King County Superior Court sponsored the competition.

The program receives support from various lawyers and judges associations and is dependent on hundreds of volunteer hours. In addition to the nineteen judges, fifty-seven volunteer lawyers rated the trial performances.

This year's fictional case, written by William Downing, explored themes of employment law, creativity and school security all with a backdrop of Edgar Allan Poe's 200th birthday. An English teacher had sued for reinstatement after being summarily

dismissed when a student brought a gun to school. The key factual issue was whether that teacher should have seen signs of potential violence in the student's Poe-inspired writings. The legal issues concerned whether the firing violated either the teacher's contract or public policy.

This year Franklin High School's Mock Trial team won the honor of first place champions in the King County competition. Winners all.

Twenty teams then advanced to compete at the state level in Thurston County Courthouse in a three-day competition, March 27-29. They argued plaintiff and defense sides about a teacher dismissed for not acting on warning signs of a troubled student in a troubling school dilemna.

Seattle Prep's team took top honors at the state level. Second place went to University Prep (Seattle), **third place**, **Franklin**, fourth, River Academy of Wenatchee and fifth place, Mercer Island. Seattle Prep and University Prep will compete in Atlanta in May, and Franklin will be competing in New Jersey in May. (Franklin's Mock Trial team of 2000 is the only Washington State team to ever win nationals.)

The team needs \$10,000 to go to Nationals.

Franklin High School's 'team xbot' partnered with team #1425 Error Code (Wilsonville, OR) and team #1569 HaYwIrE RoBoTiCs (Pocatello ID) formed the undefeated Alliance at the MS/ Seattle Regional bringing home the gold! Teams #1425, #1569 and FHS team xbot -#488 are the 2009 Microsoft/ Seattle Regional Champions! All three teams qualify to move onto the World Championship in Atlanta, GA in



The Regional Champion has been a long sought after award (nine years) and receiving the **General Motors Industrial Design Award** was icing on the cake! There were 65 teams competing from Canada, WA, OR, CA, ID and Istanbul, Turkey at Key Arena March 27 - 28, 2009.

Team xbot's robot 'Number IX' features a unique and simple solution to the game Lunacy. 'Number IX; has a Moon Rock (open weaved Orbit Balls) conveyor



system collecting the Moon Rocks off the game floor - the Crater, storing the Moon Rocks in a hopper (up to 20 Rocks) and then delivering the payload hopper quickly spewing the Moon Rocks into the opponents' moving trailer to score. IR sensors provided the opponent

trailer position to Number IX's pilot to deliver the Moon Rocks. Six teams competed on a field 24' by 57', 120 Moon Rocks and robots being driven on the plastic field with smooth plastic wheels – 1/6 coefficient similar to driving on the Moon ...therefore the name of the game Lunacy!

Mission control students lead by Program Director Donna Lew and volunteer engineering professional; designed, built and programmed (National Instrument LabView programming environment) a 120 lb. robot, five feet tall in six and half short weeks. FIRST* is a program that brings Science, Technology, Engineering and Math to students in a fun and engaging project based activity. Support FIRST teams in your neighborhood.

Team xbot is a 100% self funded team. We thank our sponsors (Boeing, Microsoft), community supporters, mentors and volunteers, who without their support (of in kind services, time and money) we would not have been able to design, build, and program the 120 lb robot, in six and a half short weeks and head to the World Championship in Atlanta, GA.

Franklin's Basketball Teams Win at State Level!!

2008-2009 was a banner basketball year for its winning teams as well as for the spectators. The boys' and girls' teams won the first place Metro 3A titles. The boys then won the Sea-King 3A District championship. They then went on to the state level where the boys' team brought home the first place 3A State Championship trophy. The Franklin girls' team won fifth place honors.

The members of both teams were energized at the start of this year's season. Both the girls and boys teams were comprised primarily of seniors who had played together over a period of years and who had talented depth from the bench.

Another asset was that they were both caring teams. Teams with individuals willing to share the spotlight and pass the ball and assist, willing and able to turn on the steam, but also skilled and focused enough to slow the pace and venture into a more controlled methodic approach. In addition, they were kind. They engaged in skillful play rather than stooping to trash talking tactics.

The boys' team was often small in stature in comparison to some of their competition, but they loomed large with their rebounding, maneuvering, and defensive playing. To say the least, they were explosively exciting. In the USA Today newspaper, they were ranked 11^{th} in the nation among high school teams. The Seattle Times noted that "the Quakers have won 11 consecutive 3A state tournament games dating to their back-to-back state titles in 1994-95."

The awards for player Peyton Siva seemed endless. He was the first Seattle area Mc Donald's All-American in three years averaging 19 points and five assists for the season. He also was rated as one of the country's five point guards and was selected by the Seattle Times as a repeat on the Star Times area team. He will be accepting a full athletic scholarship to the University of Louisville. He is also the 2008-09 recipient of the Pacific Northwest Basketball Officials Associations Prestige's Ambassador for player exhibiting exceptional relationships with fellow players, fans and officials and showing great leadership on the court. (In addition, Franklin teachers appreciate that he is on the honor roll, writes for the school newspaper and has had leading roles in drama presentations.)



Franklin 1963 graduate, Larry Gossett



Larry Gosset has no fear of addressing and embracing challenges. He was sworn in as a King County Metropolitan Councilmember for the fifth time in 2008 and has represented the most ethnically diverse district in the county since 1993. As an active member, he has taken seriously the mission of the council to ensure public trust, enhance quality of life and protect public health and safety. When asked if he plans to enter the race to occupy Ron Sims vacated seat, his response was a quick, "No".

Social justice and civil rights are of utmost importance to Gossett and he does not have to reach far to know where and when he discovered his own mission in life.

In 1966, Gossett made a one-year commitment to the VISTA program, Volunteers in Service to America. VISTA is the domestic peace corp. in that its volunteers commit to working and living in poor communities in our country. Gossett was assigned to work for Harlem Youth Inc. "When I left to participate in VISTA, I was individualistic, materialistic and thinking only about myself." Gossett said. "I will honestly say that enrolling in VISTA was in deference to being drafted and ending up in Vietnam."

"This experience caused me to return to Seattle a different person. I had grown into someone that wanted to help

bring about social change and I began to dedicate myself to do what I could to improve the conditions of the poor and other disadvantaged people in our community."

Gossett points out that when he returned to Seattle, Sam Smith was only the second African American elected to public office in Washington State.

In the fall of 1967, Gossett joined SNCC, a Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee. "Over the Thanksgiving weekend I attended a black youth conference in Los Angeles and returned to the U of W again as a student inspired to help start the Black Student Union (BSU) on campus. The goal of the organization was to create a more just society, one in which black Americans could create their own future. At that period in time only 63 black students attended the U of W out of a total student population of 32,000."

"In March of 1968, Franklin Principal Loren Ralph sent two girls home for wearing their hair natural. They were directed not to come back until they could look 'lady like'. He also refused to recognize the Black Student Union Leaders at Franklin. These leaders were very upset and were ready to tear up the school. They called Carl Miller, Aaron Dixon and me and we encouraged them to write down their demands and remain nonviolent. Approximately 130 of the 180 blacks enrolled at Franklin participated in taking over Ralph's office.

"It was a frightening experience for the students at Franklin. A huge percentage, students and teachers alike, evacuated the building. 'The teachers on the third floor went into lock down,' a counselor at the time said. Although it was intended to be a nonviolent demonstration, sheer numbers caused the incident to balloon which caused numerous police cars to position at nearby Sick's Stadium." (Now Lowe's Hardware.)

"After three and a half grueling hours negotiating, several demands were agreed to: 1) reinstate the two girls, 2) post some images of black heroes in the school, 3) introduce a Black History class into the curriculum and 4) hire a black administrator at Franklin.

On April 4, Gossett, Dixon and Miller were arrested and charged as instigators and outside agitators, which was the same day as Martin Luther King' assassination. The next day, April 5, fifteen hundred people crowded the King County Court House to witness the hearing.

"Even though we were first time offenders the all white jury took only seven minutes to find us guilty of unlawful assembly. Our sentence was six months in the county jail with an additional \$1,500 fine. In June, that verdict was appealed and subsequently overturned."

"The sit-in's outcome changed Franklin for the better. Roberta Byrd Barr was hired as its first black Vice

Franklin 1985 graduate, Jill Nishi

Jill Nishi, Class of 1985, carries on a long tradition of Quaker excellence through her significant accomplishments in public service. Nishi speaks highly of her time at Franklin, saying it helped to mold her into the person she is today.

Nishi currently serves as the Deputy Director of the U.S. Libraries Initiative at the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. There she leads a team that works to improve access to technology for all people through our nation's public libraries. When speaking with her about her role at the Foundation, she spoke of the importance of free access to computers, given the increasing reliance on the internet. An increasing number of government services are made available through the internet and many job applications are available only online. Through the work of the Foundation, more than 11,000 libraries have been assisted benefitting primarily persons under the poverty line. She is grateful to be at the Foundation and is thrilled to work where philanthropy and public service intersect.

Following graduation at Franklin, Jill attended the University of Puget Sound. At UPS, she earned a degree in Business Administration. Before entering graduate school at Princeton, Nishi worked in Los Angeles for then mayor Tom Bradley. While at Princeton, she earned a Masters in Public Administration. Her professional career has included positions at Deloitte Management, the City of Seattle, the Washington State Office of Community Trade and Economic Development, and the Gates Foundation.

Nishi spoke highly of her Franklin experience, indicating that her freshman class was the first to include students from Queen Anne and Magnolia. She spoke of the significance that desegregation



played in her schooling and the truly positive impact it made on her education. She said, "Franklin gave me important life skills for relating to a diverse group of people.". She was a student in the Humanities program and spoke of teachers like Mr. Nagel and Mr. Livingston who helped to enrich her experience. As a student government class officer she gained formative leadership skills. Like many Franklin graduates, Nishi speaks of the friendships she continues and of the great pride she feels in Franklin.

Current students and fellow alumni alike can be proud of the accomplishments of Jill Nishi and so many other Quakers who have and continue to make contributions to our local, national and global community.

Principal in September of 1968 and a Black History class was included in the curriculum."

In June 2008, the University of Washington in celebrating its Hundreth year identified what they believed to be their most influential 100 graduates, the "Wondrouf Wonderful" and Larry Gossett was on that list.

Gossett continues to advocate for the underrepresented and underprivileged, he stays involved with programs that make efforts to eliminate black-on-black violence and works on programs that help inner-city youth as they try to reduce racial and class disparities in our local criminal justice system.

Martin Luther King Scholarship Recipients

In January 2009, three exceptional Franklin students received Martin Luther King Scholarships from the Mt. Baker Community Club. The scholarships are awarded to students who have overcome significant obstacles and succeeded academically and for whom the scholarship may make a difference in whether or not they can attend college. Each student receiving the scholarship is awarded \$2,500, with a grant of \$2,500 given for the second year if the student stays in school and maintains his or her grades.

The Franklin students receiving the scholarships this year were Doriahna Dinish, Aaron Harris, and Courtney Johnson. All three students are members of CAN (College Access Now) which is a program designed to provide information and support in the college application process to students who are the first generation of their families to attend college.

Doriahna Dinish family's home was recently foreclosed; nonetheless, Doriahna has focused on school and stayed current in her coursework. Her best friend was shot in her presence on January 3. Doriahna, despite her grief, feels "more determined, more focused, and more positive" since the tragedy. Doriahna will not let "obstacles such as the ones above stop me from pursuing my goals, dreams, and aspirations."

Aaron Harris has been beset with an unstable family life. Aaron's response has been to take responsibility for his own success. Somewhere early on he connected success with academic achievement. In addition to maintaining excellent grades, Aaron has been the starting quarterback on the Franklin football team for four years and has participated in numerous community service activities.

Early in her life, **Courtney Johnson** was placed in a foster home. Despite severe economic deprivation, Courtney has focused on her school work and developed her abilities and talents. In addition to holding the lead in the school play *Bye*, *Bye Miss American Pie*, Courtney has participated in the award-winning Dance Posse and has produced a video on drinking and driving with the Black Student Union. She is the anchor person for regular programming on the school video station and intends to pursue a degree and career in Drama.

Jason Powell, Class of 2004



As you visit Franklin on a reunion tour of the school, you will see a large painting safely preserved behind plexiglas on the main floor adjacent to Franklin's main office. This piece of art, the senior project of Jason Powell, class of 2004, commemorates his favorite experiences at Franklin.

When asked as to what inspired him to create the mural for his senior project Jason responded, "I knew I wanted to do a large-scale project that would result in a tangible product in the end. I had a great time in high school; I was part of the Franklin Theatre Sports team and through that, I not only met a lot of awe-some, hilarious people who've had a huge influence on my life, but I also learned a lot about confidence and leadership. I also felt that our Theatre Sports team, though extremely successful, was largely unknown outside of a small but dedicated group."

Following graduation from Franklin, Jason studied at California College of Arts & Crafts in San Francisco and Oakland for three years. In 2007, he moved to Portland and after two years at Pacific Northwest College of Art, he will graduate with a Bachelor in Fine Arts. He is currently finishing his thesis, getting ready for a solo painting show in Seattle in July, and doing illustration, design and

branding projects for clients in Portland. In addition to working in visual art he is playing in two bands.

When asked about Franklin's influence on the direction he is taking, he answered, "Franklin gave me a comfortable and flexible place to do the things I was interested in. When I was there, I felt like if you wanted to get something done (for instance, hang a big, permanent mural in the hall) you could make it happen. Things are not usually like that. The fact that students could direct, host, organize and advertise their own plays and performances and have nearly complete creative control was amazing. I felt the school placed a lot of trust in its students. When students were willing to respect and cultivate that, the results proved to be amazing. I saw performances at Franklin that to this day, in my mind, are unrivaled in quality and creativeness. It was a special situation and I'm glad I was able to be a part of that."

Although all people we encounter have an influence on our future, Powell mentioned several Franklin people that he thought were especially important to him. "The most important people I met were other students. As an artist and designer, collaboration and peer insight are some of my most important resources. I cannot stress enough how valuable it is to have peers who understand you and want to push you. I think people sometimes look at the large size of a school as a negative point, but I loved the size of Franklin because it provided a large, diverse group of people to draw on."

"Of course, there were a lot of really great teachers. Dr. Shawn Mintek and Christina Roux, who did so much to get students in the right headspace for college with their challenging course requirements. The fact that the thesis project was so intense was awesome. Of course, Anthony Meyers and Jim Jeffreys were great,too, for knowing how to connect with students. I also need to mention the counselor, Mr. Jol Raymond, the drama teacher, Ms. Mary Smith and the school librarian, Ms. Suzanne Babayan for being so supportive. Thanks!"

As we were winding down on the interview, Jason asked if it would be all right to mention his website and an upcoming show. We are happy to support a new artist. His website is <u>jasonpowellart.com</u>. And his upcoming show is at Atlas Clothing, 1419 10th Ave, Seattle and will open on July 9, 2009 – a part of the Capitol Hill Art Walk (second Thursday of July).

Robert Nellams, Class of 1974

After a nation-wide search, Mayor Nickels appointed Robert Nellams, Class of 1974, as the Director of the Seattle Center Campus in 2006.

Nellams, who started working for the City of Seattle 25 years ago in the Department of Administrative Services, has a vision to create a premier park that inspires the human spirit, attracts an engaged community, is environmentally and financially sustainable, and supports thriving resident partners. Robert directs a staff of over 250 full-time employees and several hundred intermittent staff. "I am essentially only able to accomplish my all encompassing dream with a world class staff."

After Franklin, Nellams attended Bellevue Community College and Central Washington University receiving a Bachelor's Degree in Accounting. He went on to pass his CPA exams but decided one of his strengths was working with people and numbers, and not a desk job of numbers alone. In 1996, he served as Director of Patron Services, then Deputy Director and eventually interim Director before his present position.

A love of the job is evident as you witness Nellams' face come alive as he talks about the Seattle Center and all it entails. "This Seattle Center campus encompasses 74 acres in the core of the city. It currently is home to more than 30 resident organizations offering arts, cultural, family and sports activities. Over 5,000 events occur on campus, many simultaneously, attracting 12 million visitors annually. The campus generates \$1.15 billion in business activity, (not to mention the business activity it brings to the several adjacent businesses.) and \$387 million in labor income to King County."

"Creating activities that bring different people together to connect and rub shoulders and thus bring about understanding are what community is all about. An example might be holding a large rock concert in the key arena and an opera in McCaw Hall with the two ending simultaneously. Giving people of different interests the opportunity to see each other and perhaps define each other in a new way."

"My Franklin experience with the incredible mix of people helped prepare me to be really open to all types of diversity. I still stay in touch on occasion with two former fellow alums, Trent Johnson, LSU Baton Rouge basketball coach, and Robert DeGardo."

Something must have been in the water at Franklin in 1974 because the class produced so many interesting individuals. John Keister, who was on Almost Live for fifteen years and is now writing a TV children's learning series, Biz Kids. Kenny "G's" saxophone sound is recognized throughout the



world. Lynda Barry, who may have moved before actually graduating from Franklin, is renowned as a cartoonist and author. James Rasmussen, who directs "The Jazz Police", plays the fugal horn, volunteered and assisted the FHS band program. He recently was named as director of the Duwamish Longhouse Cultural Center. Robin Asher, is a graphic designer that has illustrated the '74 class reunion invitations, in addition to designing several items for the FHS Alumni Association (au gratis). Tom Ikeda served as president of the Japanese-American Chamber of Commerce and Dr. Bryan Maruhashi, DDS keeps his clients smiling. In addition, we do not want to forget Peter Kimes, Michael Ikeda and Martin Patricelli, who are all FHS Alumni Lifetime members. The list goes on ad infinitum.

If Seattle Center is the heart of Seattle, then Robert Nellams is its personal trainer. His job is a revolving organized turmoil. In addition to being in charge of four large festivals: Bumbershoot, the Seattle International Children's Festival, the Northwest Folklife Festival, and the Bite of Seattle, he helps organize and hosts events occurring throughout all the seasons of the year. With the departure of the Sonics, the KeyArena is now ready to take on future challenges. KeyArena is the permanent home of the WNBA Seattle Storm through 2018 and is preparing to host Seattle University Redhawks NCAA Division I Men's Basket-

Franklin Garden Improvement Project Continues to Grow

In spite of the miserably cold 2008-2009 winter, the raised gardens on the north side main entrance of Franklin are beginning to show improvement.

Joann Fukuma, Franklin's athletic director, Gretchen DeDecker, the Seattle School District self-help program director, FHS students, two district grounds personnel, alums and friends of Franklin dug in, weeded and planted together at an extended work party.

However, the real improvements were evidenced when local landscaper Gabe




